Each year, in addition to our scholarships focused on GPA, we award scholarships to undergrads involved in special projects designed to enhance their career or general knowledge-in short, their "Passion". These are their stories:

Teddy Parsley-Human impacts on the Natural Environment in Australia \$400



My past month was spent in Queensland, Australia, studying the human impact on the environment. Australia is the perfect place to study the anthropogenic impact with its vast variety of ecosystems, organisms and weather. We traveled around the east coast of northern Australia visiting areas of the protected rainforest and studying the endemic species that call it home. We also visited areas of the Outback and learned about the Aboriginal (Native land owners) impact on the land prior to the European settlement. Lastly, the final days were spent on the Great Barrier Reef doing fish population surveys and learning how the choices made on the land significantly affect the reefs health.

Zachary Salyer

From June 8th to June 24th I went to Pikes Peak with Buckeye Current, an Ohio State student project team that builds and races an electric motorcycle. The first week we were there we went to track days and had some practice on the mountain. The next week we practiced on the mountain, but on the Wednesday before the race, one of our vehicles was in



an accident. It was a very traumatic experience and luckily no one was injured. We continued working on getting the bike prepared the next few days. Unfortunately, during the race our rider crashed. Luckily, our rider only suffered minor injuries but the bike was destroyed. It was a stressful trip that made the team face and overcome challenges, with a disappointing ending. Now we must rebuild from scratch and prepare for the future. This trip taught me professional and leadership skills.

Waitt Hanlin and his Mom-Ultra Marathon-\$200

On June 9th of this year, I made my first attempt at running 100 miles in 24 hours at the Eagle Up Ultra. The night before, I slept in a tent along with a small village of about 200 other tents and over 350 racers. I woke up at 4:30 AM to stretch and eat breakfast, and the race started after the presentation of the colors and the national



anthem at 6:00 AM. My body and mind held up through the heat and rain until I began having intense pain in my left knee at about mile 46 of the loop. I crossed the start/ finish line one last time before deciding to pull myself from the race after a total of 50 miles (10 laps) in 11:14:44.

Though I finished first in my class for the 50-mile ultra, I was still severely disappointed that I wasn't able to complete the 100 miles I set out to do after hundreds of miles of training. I'm also disappointed at the way in which I pulled myself out of the race. However, I did gain the painful perspective of what it feels like to quit something after committing to it and having so many people support me in the endeavor. On the other hand, mother was able to complete 31 miles after 15 hours, which filled me with a sense of pride because she had only decided to sign up for the race the day before it took place. I know that if I hadn't run the race, she wouldn't have challenged herself to such a feat at age 56 and I may have not run as far without seeing her on the course.

Andriy Vlashyn-Volunteer Healthcare project in Thailand -\$400

As a healthcare volunteer in Thailand, I devoted my time to creating and presenting health education in schools and surrounding community centers. I taught basic English to kindergarteners as well as human anatomy at the local schools. I led physical education programs, sports, and crafts at the center for those with disabilities to promote healthy lifestyles and creativity. I helped conduct physiotherapy at the center to promote mobility and functional ability. When I was not volunteering within the local community, I had the opportunity to explore Thailand with other volunteers and make memories and friendships that I will never forget.



I found myself questioning my future and noticed a change of perception on life and those around me. Before this journey, I was unsure of what my future profession would be. Although I did not gain a specific answer overseas, I realized that I greatly enjoy working with children and helping those with disabilities. I noticed how quickly I was able to make the unfamiliar become familiar. I acclimated to the culture with ease and found myself feeling comfortable and welcome wherever I went. With this acknowledgement came the realization that my future profession must include working with other cultures.



The History of New Beginnings of Central Florida

It Started with Steve and Linda Smith

On a cool Sunday morning in January 2007 following church service in Clermont, Florida, my wife, Linda, and I met a man who would transform our lives forever.

Linda and I had recently retired from our corporate executive jobs, and moved to Clermont from Columbus, Ohio. We wondered what God had planned for us going forward.

This encounter in this particular Sunday answered our question. After church service, a couple invited us to join them for breakfast and get to know each other. At the restaurant door sat a man on a bench who asked if we knew of a church he could walk to. He had no car. Although our church wasn't within walking distance, we offered a ride to take him, then pick him up after the service to take him home.

I have no idea why we did this, as this was highly unusual for me.



A Startling Discovery

After I picked him up after church, we took him to lunch. He was new in town and seeking a job. He told us that his father died a few years prior and he tried managing the company but failed. He had moved to Clermont seeking a new beginning.

After lunch, I was taking him home and was startled when I stopped my car in front of some woods. He told me that was where he lived...in the woods.

Since it was going to go below freezing that evening, I told him that I would call our pastor to find a safe, warm place to stay until he secured employment. Another surprise for me.... there was only one small home far from Clermont providing housing for many men and women. They let him stay there and the next day I took him to find work.

Change, but not enough

He secured employment with a friend from church, and I took him home that evening. I promised to take him to and from work daily, until I found a place for him to live, nearer to Clermont.

I met the other people living in the small home, and offered to also help them find work and better housing. Linda and I started searching on the internet for agencies who could help. We figured many others would be losing their job, their home, and their hope in years ahead.

Another surprise.... there were no agencies helping this population in Clermont. The drive to Orlando where agencies could possibly help was too far away.

I had to do something

Consequently, after much prayer, we committed our lives to help the homeless get back on their feet and we asked several caring Christians to help us form a non-profit. Thus, we launched New Beginnings of Central Florida on June 17, 2007, with a retired pastor, counselor, job trainer, social worker, accountant, and an attorney. They all volunteered their time. Jesus says that we are to feed the hungry, clothe the naked, care for the sick, and house the poor. Linda and I began to understand what that verse really means. We promised to raise funds for housing and wages for the staff serving this ministry.

What has happened since

God has been amazing as He has since provided the funds to acquire:

- 2 large homes that can accommodate 26 at any one time for those wanting to turn their life around
- 8 affordable housing units available for families, seniors, veterans, single men and moms with children
- 35 paid caring staff members over 1,000 volunteers serving annually
- 3 large thrift stores throughout Central Florida that give away tens of thousands of dollars worth of clothing and household items yearly
- 3 drop-in centers where we help the homeless and hungry of Central Florida
- 3 pantries to help people who are hungry and in need of a hand up

In 2016, the State of Florida awarded New Beginnings \$19 million to build 96 affordable rental units that are desperately needed in Clermont.

Our mission is to empower people in need to live a responsible life, and we accomplish this by teaching one to fish rather than by just handing out fish.

We feel very blessed that God led us to breakfast on a chilly January morning after church service. We know that He has many more blessings for New Beginnings.

We are very grateful for the many caring people in our community who care for those who are hungry, need clothing and are sick and homeless; without God's leading, and these caring servants following Him, there wouldn't be a New Beginnings!

How I give: Chris Burke '00 By Todd Jones

The Las Vegas alumni club president is leading the charge in outreach to help the Vegas community.

An energy source exists in the Nevada desert apart from the neon lights of casinos. The vibe stems from the Ohio State Alumni Club of Las Vegas, powered in part by the radiant personality of the chapter's president, Chris Burk '00. "I've always been fairly Type A, a go-getter," says Burk, a lawyer who grew up in Beavercreek, Ohio, and moved to Vegas in 2004.

Burk's leadership steered the club through a somber mission in October, when 58 people were killed in Las Vegas in the worst mass shooting in modern U.S. history.

"Chris really rallied the troops," says club member Kim Wheeler Makita '98, a physician's assistant who treated some of the 500-plus people injured when a gunman opened fire at a concert.

Burk was behind a flurry of emails and social media requests that began the morning after the shooting and led to the alumni chapter's donation of food and water to the Ronald McDonald House of Greater Las Vegas. Club members followed up by raising nearly \$4,000 for the victims' fund through a GoFundMe drive and football ticket raffle.

Burk also organized a competition to replenish local blood banks through a blood battle pitting Buckeyes against Michigan State alumni on the day their teams met at Ohio Stadium in November.

"This isn't a fad," says Vegas club member Ryan Lower '04. "We've been trying to make a commitment to make things better and help out the community." Burk, who is married with two sons, credits his chapter's board members for responding a couple years ago when The Ohio State University Alumni Association urged the club to become more active in community outreach.

Members say their Vegas chapter has been rejuvenated under Burk's stewardship. They've fed the homeless and raised money for the Nevada Paralyzed Veterans of America. In December, they packed 146 lunches at the Ronald McDonald House for children at two local hospitals.

"We are an extension of Ohio State, and we take that very seriously," Burk says. "We want to be nothing but honorable and carry ourselves with high integrity and character. We know that Ohio State expects that of us."
